Just let go and de-clutter

As we get older, we should become more aware of the brevity of life and the need to focus on our accountability to Christ for how we have lived and used His gifts to honour Him, bless others and further His kingdom. There's no 'extra' time to waste on things that will deceive, disappoint or divert us from that. We need to evaluate everything in our lives and stick to our 'core business' even if it means rejecting the pleas and plans of others. It is foolish to just hope that good things might happen; I need to plan today that they will happen.

I still remember a cartoon from the New Yorker magazine of decades past, in which a man on his deathbed lamented to those around him that "I should have bought more crap." Highly unlikely, but we live in a culture where we buy things we don't need with money we don't have to impress people we don't even like. This outward materialism is a symptom of a deeper malaise within us: a reluctance to not only recognize our limitations but also to choose to simplify, de-clutter and focus. That shift must come from the inside out.

Guard your heart—and your time

Over-extending our commitment to even good things reduces our effectiveness in daily life and ministry. Often we get caught up in issues and spend hours daily filling our minds with things that just don't matter and drag us down individually and collectively: mounting debt, chronic regret, worry, gossip, carrying bitterness, going with the crowd, needing to share our opinions about partisan politics half a globe away. These inhibit our ability to live freely. Out they go!

kingdoms, addiction to social media and entertainment, being critical and selfish in spirit. Kick those to the curb.

There is great freedom in de-cluttering and maintaining a simple lifestyle. We should measure our satisfaction by being free of want, finding fulfillment in relationships and pursuing new knowledge and experiences.

Learning to let go of such mental clutter will free us to pursue the things on God's heart such as loving our neighbours, celebrating goodness, investing in the kingdom and inspiring others to also 'have better plans'.

Everyone wanted a piece of Paul, and yet he was able to live and work free from the constraints of others. He was not lashed to his past. The world in our home

LOGOS HOPE

A hundred people attended an onboard event organised especially for Japanese people living in the Argentine capital, Buenos Aires. Shinya Funakoshi (Japan) wanted the community to know that they were welcome on board Logos Hope. The children living on board performed a drama, musicians gave a percussion show and different dances were showcased. Jun Nukada (Japan) shared a message in his mother tongue and each Japanese crewmember serving on the ship made sure to be involved in some way.

The guests showed their delight at meeting people from their homeland. Pastor Luis Yonamine, born in Argentina to Japanese parents, explained that while members of the group that performed their traditional dance at the event were not believers, they felt privileged to be part of an event on the ship and that it had been a positive opportunity.

Pastor Luis had served on board one of OM's previous vessels, Doulos, from 1981 to 1983. "We wanted them to see Logos Hope and see not just what Christians say but also what we do; showing our faith through our work," he says. Pastor Luis wants the community to see that truly knowing God isn't about religion, but about a personal relationship.

"I believe that when a non-believer comes to a place like this, full of prayer, the Holy Spirit touches hearts," Pastor Luis said. "Christians and churches should use the ship's visit as an opportunity to bring others along, for God does miracles. It is also an exceptional opportunity to travel the world in an hour, meeting volunteers from so many countries."

God speaks my language!

Shinya explains, "Japan is a least-reached country, but I've been told that in Argentina, there are many opportunities to hear the gospel in Spanish. First-generation Japanese people need to hear it in Japanese. After the ship leaves, I believe Pastor Luis can continue the task."

"This event showed the visitors that Christians are not only in Argentina, but in the whole world," Pastor Luis says. Several people phoned him after the event, to express their gratitude for the experience. The pastor thanked Logos Hope for coming to his country and using the rich multitude of nationalities on board to connect with others.

I have what you gave me

IRELAND

"I joke that I called in for a cup of tea, and two years later I'm still here," shared Jarlath, OM's I.T. manager in Ireland.

Jarlath first heard about OM years ago when he saw an OM poster that said: 'Go into all the world' on the wall of a church in his city. Years later, Jarlath decided to retrain in I.T. and needed work experience for his classes. The OM office provided the training he needed, and an avenue to serve God's Kingdom. "After I finished my classes, I said I'd come in for a few days a week to help, even though I felt very inadequate," Jarlath remembered.

Missionaries are usually defined as 'people sent on a religious mission to a foreign country.' There's a preconception that missionaries are street preachers who have moved to another country to share the gospel. However, there are many with behind-the-scenes roles that play equally

important parts in a ministry—and they often stay in their home country.

Much like Jarlath, Thiago was introduced to OM in the past and came back to serve years later. "I began working with OM as a work experience student, helping with anything I could." After the semester ended, Thiago agreed to continue volunteering in the office part-time. People with practical skills like Jarlath and Thiago are invaluable to OM offices. Jarlath urged: "We have missionaries who are born evangelists, but we also need the practical skills—construction, secretarial, what have you—who are willing to do that to benefit the overall ministry."

There are lots of different aspects of ministry besides preaching. Jarlath knows that: "You can be involved because you clearly have skills that the Lord wants to use to extend His Kingdom. Just ask! You might be just the person they need."

Something new on Crocodile Island

ZAMBIA

"I love people on this island so much," said Kelvin Chibuye, explaining why he wanted to stay on Crocodile Island when so many others have refused. The island consists of four fishing villages on Lake Tanganyika. There is one community school but no clinic, which is a half-hour boat ride away from Mpulungu, the main town on the Zambian side. The people on the island are bound to witchcraft for fishing, successful business and physical protection. There were churches, but no pastor was willing to stay beyond an occasional Sunday to preach. Without a strong Christian influence, witchcraft, polygamy and drunkenness were still common in the churches. OM partnered with a church in Mpulungu to send a local couple, Kelvin and Florence, to Crocodile Island as missionaries in 2016.

At first, the Headman of the village was not open to receiving them. He couldn't believe that outsiders would be willing to stay on the island with a pure motive of sharing God's love and truth. Understanding the need for a spiritual breakthrough, the OM team went to fast and pray on the island before they officially moved in. The couple wants to make sure that people from all backgrounds have a chance to experience the love of God and see real transformation in all areas of their lives. From house visits to youth and children's ministry, leadership development to Self Help Groups, they make sure that people have opportunities to grow. Every night, there is Bible study and prayer time at their house that is open to all.

Breakthrough by prayer

People were initially sceptical and even tried to stop their work. Yet by seeking to love their neighbours, people have



started to ask for prayer. One neighbour originally sent to teach about Islam came to know Jesus.

One night, an unconscious young man, David, was brought to the couple's house. They prayed for him throughout the night. "He was troubled by evil spirits," said Kelvin. After David came to his senses, Kelvin invited him to stay with them for a while. "I wanted to make sure he understood what had happened and start to live rightly with God." David was baptised and has started sharing his story with other youth.

Not giving up

Running a small business was insufficient to support the Chibuye family. They work in town during the week and return to the island from Friday until Monday with a packed schedule of ministry.

They have developed young believers to stand on their own and to help. Many share their testimony of how God has set them free from drinking and witchcraft. Even the Headman is now open to know more about the Bible.

Training and outreach

PAKISTAN

Central to the ministry of OM is the training and equipping of the next generation of disciples to be bold and courageous witnesses of Christ in a dominant Islamic environment by overcoming the natural fears of a minority community under pressure.

OM recruits and trains young men and women to know and love God and to be grounded in Scripture. This training includes classroom and group sessions for regular study and to resource Bible Camps.

They are also regularly involved in evangelistic outreach. Men's teams engage the marketplace, using literature, films and personal witness to both nominal Christians and non-Christians. Women's teams often engage in schools and youth work, home visitation and one-to-one discussion and testimony. Such training increases their faith and courage and strengthens the whole Christian community.

OM recruits young Christian men and women ready to learn and express their faith and walk with Christ. In the practical outreach experience, OM teams present the gospel message of salvation and discipleship to minority groups including nominal Christians and especially to the majority Muslim community which forms 96% of the population.

Your financial support is an investment in the future development of both God's people and the surrounding society that desperately needs a message of hope and peace.

Food for body and soul

SOUTH SUDAN

Independent since 2011, South Sudan is the world's youngest country. Ongoing tribal tensions have contributed to government instability and armed conflict among the country's 10.2 million people, nearly one-fifth of whom are internally displaced. OM teams reach out to these suffering communities that have experienced violence, major injuries, illness, inadequate potable water and infectious diseases.

Hunger is real

Monthly relief outreaches help the elderly, widows and orphans. The teams spend four days among each group of displaced people, assessing needs, listening to stories, preaching the gospel, training people to study the Bible in small groups and providing limited medical care. "We give them hope that they are not forgotten," Elia, an OM worker, said.

One woman admitted that she had been a believer but had stopped attending church. The relief packet and the volunteers' compassion helped restore her relationship with God. She said: "I got my faith back, and I learnt to thank God in all situations."

Equipping a new generation

Last year, a seven-day youth conference brought together 140 people from

multiple tribes. As they spent time together learning, playing sports, worshipping, praying, sharing and reaching out, they created a new future for their generation. Instead of letting their tribal history dictate behaviour, the youth embraced their identity in Christ and their role in bringing peace. Pray that the youth in South Sudan would receive sound education and biblical training to be prepared for future ministry.

Getting fit for service

MIDDLE EAST

In recent years, team members have experienced a growing need to involve more Arab believers on international teams as local churches began expanding their vision and capacity to send missionaries. “What makes OM unique is a call to partner and a focus to go where there are no churches,” described Jeremy.

As a practical way to prepare local believers from both Muslim and Christian backgrounds to be sent on mission long-term, the field debuted its year-long Arab Internship Programme which begins with a three-month in-residence training. Participants then join an existing team in the Near East (Lebanon, Jordan, Syria and Iraq) or pioneer a new movement in an unreached area.

Locals know best

Participants come with a lot of ministry experience, fluent Arabic and varying degrees of cultural awareness. By equipping interns with reproducible ministry tools, helping them to thrive in a team setting, OM hopes to send a stream of Arab workers into the least-reached regions.

The speed at which the local interns can start making an impact is “quite startling,” Jeremy said. “The guys in the internship school, within a month, had opened the Bible 21 times [on house visits]. As a foreigner, I was happy to be able to buy fruit after a month [of studying Arabic].”

The right fit

Hamad and Nidal were two of the first Arabs to complete the training module. Hamad had been looking for an opportunity to use evangelism training. Nidal wanted to begin ministry in a place where nothing was happening. They learnt how to facilitate Discover Bible Studies (DBS) on visits, first practicing it themselves. “We applied the Bible to our own lives before we expected other people to accept it,” Hamad explained. They learned how to talk about Jesus to people using language Muslims understand. Answered prayers on visits were a stand-out hallmark of Nidal’s time in training.

Nidal and Hamad joined a nearby OM church planting team, allowing them to develop relationships made during training as well as expand to new families. “There are no churches here, and very few people doing outreach. There are few people ministering to Syrian refugees,” Nidal said.

Pray that the Arab Internship Programme would find new sources of funding so that it can continue to train and equip local workers to reach the least-reached areas of the Near East (Lebanon, Jordan, Syria and Iraq). Pray for grace as current interns join existing teams and wisdom as future groups look to establish new teams in new locations.

A story worth telling

CENTRAL ASIA

Talking about God isn’t the problem; talking about Jesus causes a reaction. “He will either be the stumbling block or the One that they really want to know,” explained Catherine who, with Edward, has spent the past decade living among an unreached people group—learning their language, discipling the first known believers and now mobilizing believers to share the gospel in remote towns. During that time, 15 individuals have come to faith.

“One privilege of being there long enough to see some believers return was to encourage them. They didn’t know any other Jesus followers in the area. God gave us the privilege of discipling them as they came back,” Catherine said.

When Edward and Catherine sought to duplicate their efforts in another city, David and Ellen took over team leadership in the mountains telling Bible stories to their language helpers and working out the best ways to explain gospel themes.

Go tell it on the mountains

Eliza, a local believer who moved back to the mountains, started practicing her professional trade in her new home. A church in the city gave her a grant to purchase more equipment and take on apprentices. She hired two local girls, taught them her craft and started

telling them about Jesus. “Sometimes they would watch movies in the national language about Jesus, and she would share her testimony. They were amazed that, though she was from their ethnic group, she was a believer in Jesus,” Ellen recounted. Eliza read the Bible with the girls and showed them who Jesus is.

“Why didn’t anyone tell us this before?” one wondered. “We’ve grown up our whole lives and not known about Jesus.” Eliza gave both apprentices New Testaments in the national language; one of them took it home to her father, read it with him and watched DVDs about Jesus with him, too. Both young women decided to follow Jesus. “They’re some of the first people we know of that have become believers in our town,” Ellen stressed.

“As more local people share with others, our prayer is that family groups or natural communities of believers will gather together around the Word, so that none need to feel isolated,” Catherine explained. Pray that these believers would faithfully read God’s Word and find encouragement and strength in His promises. Pray the new believers would understand and embrace suffering as a context for spiritual growth. Pray that family groups would come to faith to provide community for isolated individuals.

Short-term opportunities

Portugal

Creativity, passion, engagement with children and endurance will be key features of your time in Portugal! OM workers regularly engage the community in children's ministry and evangelism that can impact whole families with a deeper message of Bible principles and morals.

The first days will focus on preparation, set up and design. The second portion will be spent working at a festival and, with the team, leading the children's care section. Expect long hours and lots of fun!

Logos Hope

Life on the ships is fast-paced and intense. Many who have been on the STEP (Short Term Exposure Programme) bear witness to its impact on their lives – a unique opportunity for young people (18-39) to serve God on board the ship. Living and working alongside

people from different nations gives you firsthand experience of cross-cultural Christian work. The days will be filled with practical work (40 hrs/week; 8 hrs/day). Outreach Teams are one day per week; you will participate in an assigned ministry experience, whether an onboard programme or an onshore event.

Japan

'Taste Discipleship' is a 3-week discipleship training time in Miyagi prefecture of northeast Japan. Participants will receive training in evangelism, leading someone to Jesus, starting long-term discipleship

Longer-term opportunities

Ukraine

Many ministries in OM are looking for qualified ESL/TESOL English teachers to work toward the purpose of seeing vibrant communities of Jesus followers among the least reached. Some of these teaching opportunities involve building relationships with a particular people group, while others involve equipping missions workers for future ministry.

If you are self-motivated and enjoy new challenges in reaching those who have never heard the gospel, consider using your skills with OM. You need to be able to develop an English curriculum for people starting at the A1 level, and be able to have someone achieve the B2 level. You should be able to use your teaching opportunities in a discipleship role to believers, as well as an evangelistic role to unbelievers.
